

University Sustainability Coalition Meeting March 15, 2022 10am - 11am Virtual Meeting

The University Sustainability Coalition was formed with one goal: To increase higher education sustainability efforts in Louisiana.

The idea of forming the university sustainability coalition was born from a steering committee of university representatives developing the university affiliate program as part of an EPA Trash Free Waters Grant with UL Lafayette and Keep Louisiana Beautiful. There are no fees associated with being a part of the coalition, just a seat at the table with your peers to communicate and is open to anyone in higher ed sustainability. Introductions were made.

Report:

The University Sustainability Coalition was formed to provide a platform to discuss sustainability challenges and solutions that are common across higher ed institutions. With that said, the meeting was turned over to Liz Davey of Tulane University for a presentation on Move Out Challenges.

When students move in, they tend to bring everything but tend to leave much of it behind when they move out leaving the university staff to deal with it. Tulane has developed three models for addressing the challenges of what to do with those items left behind by students. Items left behind range from food and personal care items to clothes and household items. It is important to involve both student volunteers and community organizations such as Goodwill to assist and facilitate with the donation process. The most successful effort at Tulane has been the Trash to Treasures sale where goods are collected throughout the year and then sold annually to other students with proceeds being donated to other worthwhile causes. Educating students to reduce waste and to recycle/reuse is also a challenge. The University provides fliers to each of the residence halls and sets up designated collection sites to encourage students to properly dispose of their belongings versus just throwing it all in a dumpster. Success is largely dependent on having enough volunteers to organize and execute a disposal plan and to make it as easy and convenient as possible for the students to comply with the plan.

Following the presentation, questions were addressed, and participants shared ideas on how move out challenges were addressed on their individual campuses. Common issues centered on having space to store items for future sale, recruiting student volunteers and educating students on recycling/reusing items they no longer needed. Providing incentives to recycle and/or disincentives for using the dumpster, might encourage students to be more mindful of their actions when moving out.

As a reminder, the university affiliate certification program will conclude in May at which time the seven universities currently participating will become certified affiliates. Applications for the next group of affiliate universities may be submitted in June. Louisiana in one of only two states that offers a university affiliate program. The other state being California.

Also, as a member of the coalition, you are encouraged to participate in Love the Boot week which is KLB's annual campaign to promote community cleanup and beautification projects across the state.
