SUSTAINABILITY ENGAGEMENT

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HOW TO WE FRAME SUSTAINABILITY?

- How do we talk about sustainability sets the stage for how students perceive sustainability concepts. This helps to avoid misconceptions. Aka: "Sustainability is just recycling"
- We start by defining sustainability and then lead into topics we work in and discuss it in a broad sense. We tell students that sustainability is far reaching. It has so many applications and it can be connected into every major.

• The next two slides are used by UL at the beginning of our sustainability trainings and when we talk to classes.

1987: UN World Commission on Environment and Development: *Our Common Future* aka "The Brundtland Report"

"Meeting the needs of the present without compromising the ability of future generations to meet their own needs. " (WCED, 1987).

SUSTAINABILITY TOPICS

Everything that we do fits into these 8 main topics. Breaking it into these categories helped students grasp the broad concept of sustainability easily. (AKA not just recycling) We also connect these topics with the UN's Sustainability Goals so students can understand the big picture.



SUSTAINABLE GOALS



We also like to ask students to see how their major or interests can fit into these sustainability goals so students can make a personal connection to sustainability.

ENGAGEMENT MINDSET

- Impact. To make sustainability attainable we like to emphasis that sustainability is a goal at every level and that every action from small changes to our daily habitats to green advances in large scale industry all matter and makes an impact.
- **Empower**. We encourage the mindset of being an "**imperfect environmentalists**" no one should ever feel guilty or shame about what they cannot do but rather, they should be proud of their efforts and always keep trying to do their best.
- Educate. The audience must be aware of a problem and/or the opportunity for action before any engagement can occur. Providing accessible and credible information will help avoid dismissal or skepticism and ensure understanding. Ex: Coastline is disappearing due to...
- Measure and Document. Tracking data and taking photos is great to quantify and showcase the impacts and reiterate the importance of sustainability. TU OOS, I try to show and discuss individual impact together with institutional initiatives, to cut down on confusion between infrastructural impacts and personal action.
- **Reflect.** We encourage **mindfulness, reflection, and thinking** of the short term and long-term impacts of our actions and daily habits as we try to be the best environmental stewards we can be. Start the discussion about sustainability.

HOW CAN YOU BUILD A SUSTAINABILITY COMMUNITY?

• TABLE AT EVENTS AND ORIDENTATIONS!!!

 This was UL's most effective strategy. By tabling at orientation and handing out native wildflower seeds in packages UL collected 300 students who signed up to learn more about sustainability, stay up to date with our events and to be a part of the new Students for Sustainability organization. This helped develop a mailing list for events.



HOW CAN YOU BUILD A SUSTAINABILITY COMMUNITY?

- Offer engaging events through the semester across all sectors of sustainability (partnering helps tremendously). Post event flyers everywhere
 - Emails / Digital Screens/ Campus Calendars/ Social Medias
- Stay on top of social medias that students use.
 - This is one of the best ways to share events. Additionally taking tons of photos at sustainability events are very valuable for promoting all that you do. **Hint:** photos of students participating in events typically get the most engagement (100+ likes)
- **Partner!** Partner with community nonprofits, businesses, campus offices, and other student organizations for events and educational opportunities.
 - RA Sustainability groups, Connect with **established** orgs and existing departments!!

HOW CAN YOU BUILD A SUSTAINABILITY COMMUNITY?

- **Stay Engaged.** Create a way to keep the sustainability conversations going. For example UL is building a new Sustainability discord where events are share events, local resources, ideas, what everyone is up to, polls, and even memes. There are 50 members and growing.
- **Push for Sustainability to be a part of all levels of your institution.** (Events, dining, athletics, in the classroom, service, residential life, operations, etc)
- **Be present.** Visit classes! Table at University events. Talk to students. Talk to students. Talk to student organizations. Talk to RAs. Talk to colleagues to find partnerships. etc
- **Connect students** with recent grads Ex: Tulane organized (2-3 years) recent grads for a 30 minute panel format mentor session on zoom.
- **Connect** with any sustainability related student organizations. If a sustainability student origination does not exist find the related environmental student orgs that already exist. **Connect** all the related student organizations with yourself and with one another.

Ways to engage / Integrate Sustainability

- Students are our inside people they can represent sustainability in classrooms, organizations, athletics, events, their homes and in the community
 - Student Workers/ Grad Students can be a bridge
- Student Orgs with similar themes
 - Biking, planting, nature organizations can be allies
- Student Projects or research topics
- Student Discipline --- seemed seamlessly tie into service opportunities for Tulane
- Classes with Sustainability related topics/ Univ Classes

- Speaker events/ Seminar Series on sustainability topics
- Volunteer events Love the Boot clean ups, coastal plantings, community gardens, etc
- Required Service hours litter pickup survey, volunteering at food pantries, etc
- Set the example! Big impact that's visible and public (Pick up litter when you see it, etc.)
- Use social media as a tool to promote yourselves
- Work with partners for move in / project showcases / residential halls / dining
- Training Sessions (Students, Facility, Staff)

ROADBLOCKS

- Lower numbers of student engagement/ volunteers when compared to pre-covid
- It often is hard to engage students at all points of the semester. Engagement typically dies off in the summer and as the semesters approach finals.
 - Remain mindful of the academic calendar to not overlap with midterms or finals when scheduling events
- Campus policies/ or a mindset that slows progress
- Unwilling campus participants that slow or halt progress.
- Minimal campus investment in sustainability
- Minimal funding or resources to support sustainability initiatives this is a big one
 - Options sustainability fund (coordinate with SGA), asking for donations of trees/etc., foundation donation account, student graduating class gift, grants, earth week fundraising, etc
- Staff turnover / student turn over
- Having no platform to post events / having no platform or resources to make graphics / limited ways to communicate / minimal contacts or partners
- A lot of this is learning as you go so don't be afraid to try somethings out to see what works and what does not work.

What are some of your campus's roadblocks?

WHATYOU CAN DO?

- Host programs on sustainable living(housing), saving energy(engineering), and minimizing food waste(dining hall), etc. Lot of opportunities to partner with other departments on campus
- Use social media to promote sustainability and sustainability events
- Promote recycling in the residential halls/academic buildings if able
- Be aware of your impact and document and measure everything you can.

- Attend Sustainability events on campus and in the community. Table if possible!
- Get involved with the local related businesses, non-profits, and the city.
- Engage in Community Service
- Partner with Students!
 - Students can advocate for sustainability infrastructure on campus, such as water bottle refilling stations, bike lanes and nonmotorized infrastructure, green spaces, urban forestry, campus gardens, rain gardens, habitats, ... really anything you want! Students hold the power.




